SPOTLIGHT

Growing up, Hyemin Kim was often hurt by the words and actions of bullying. After several years of suffering, she decided to fight back. Hyemin, 19, did not turn to hurtful words or violence. She trained to become a youth counselor so she could help other kids who have been bullied. Since then, she has counseled at least 500 kids via e-mail and in face-to-face sessions.

Last May, Hyemin was honored as a top international volunteer by the Prudential Spirit of Community Awards. The South Korean native traveled to Washington, D.C., for the festivities, where she and other honorees received their awards.

Hyemin says that the biggest reward has been the friends she has made through her work. "The more we share our pain and bad experiences, the closer we become," she told TFK in an e-mail. "I even made

friends with some kids who used to give me a hard time but now help me with the counseling."

Bullying has been around for a long time. But Hyemin is hopeful that if people keep talking about bullying and looking for solutions, it won't be such an issue. More recently, she has seen signs of change through her work with an Internet counseling cafe. "I recruited same-age counselors, and most of them have experienced bullying," Hyemin says. "If such kids come out in larger numbers to help other kids suffering from the same problem, we will be able to see a future where you [won't be able to find] the word bullying in a dictionary."
